








Home of the Tohono O'odham, who endure, and their elders, the Hohokam, whose mark on the land is subtle but everlasting.

A simple shelter nestled within a bosque of mesquites.


Within those walls, philosophers, artists, seekers of all kinds have come to find solace, peace, and understanding in the midst of this mystical landscape.

We meet two gentle souls who tell us the story of the garden, working with the Earth and with the community to enrich the soils and feed one another.



Deeper in the riverbed the edges are soft and loamy, caked with cracked, gray clay. It is wet and cool in your hand.





You find yourself on a well-travelled highway, lined with giant mistletoe-crowned cottonwoods and invasive tamarisk.

Their deep root systems peeking through the walls at the edges of the riverbed, disappearing underground as they tap into the subterranean river that runs beneath your feet. You wonder if the landscape must yearn for its perennial flowing water.



Does it ache at the loss of its engineers, the departed beavers who nourished the soils with the byproducts of their work? As the world changes, do more of the creatures of this place face the same fate as the great brown bears that once roamed these hills?
